

On behalf of the men and women of the Franklin Police Department, I thank you for taking the time to read our 2023 Annual Report. This report reflects the activities, services, and accomplishments performed by the members of the police department to keep the City of Franklin a safe and secure place to live, work, and visit.

2023 was a year of remarkable change within the department. Near the end of the year, Chief Rick Oliva announced his intention to retire in early 2024 after leading the department for over 18 years. Additionally, the department hired 15 officers to fill vacancies, many of which had gone unfilled since retirements and resignations in 2022.

While recruiting remained a challenge for law enforcement agencies across the country, we were able to fill our 15 vacancies with a combination of talented lateral transfers and eager individuals new to law enforcement. A significant reason we were successful in this endeavor is our department's reputation as being a well-trained and well-equipped department that is strongly supported both by its elected officials and the community. We are excited to welcome the new additions to the department and are looking forward to watching them learn, grow, and solidify the foundation of the Franklin Police Department for many years to come.

We are honored to serve the City of Franklin, and thank you for putting your trust in us.
